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## Host a Book Club



### The JIF Book Club

An engaging and educational platform to grow and inspire a global community of consumers and advocates. You will promote support for Justice in Fashion and similar organisations which are committed to raising awareness of inequalities of wealth, power and risk in the Ready-Made Garment (RMG) industry to campaign for its reform.



### Guidelines

- Inclusive engagement will be promoted through video-conferencing discussions from the reading of shared books.
- Prior to the session, you can request a £10 to £20 donation from those wishing to sign-up. This prevents people from reserving a space and then not joining the book club which could take one of the limited places from another individual.
- Recommended books are: A Harvest of Thorns by Corban Addison, Fashionopolis by Dena Thomas, and To Die For by Lucy Siegle.
- Host through Zoom, or a similar video-conferencing platform, with yourself leading the initial discussion and facilitating throughout.
- Remember, the Justice in Fashion team are here to provide 1-2-1 support for ambassadors in rolling out their book clubs in their community. Feel free to get in touch!
- We advise you to limit participants to 10 people per session to ensure everyone feels comfortable and have the opportunity to participate.
- To begin the book club, it is highly effective to encourage everyone to engage through asking participants to briefly introduce themselves at the start of the session. Involvement can also be encouraged through asking people to read out loud from certain sections of the book, or parts that resonated with them.
- Importantly, whilst the book clubs are about important topics, we also would like them to be an exciting space for discussions. We recommend that you suggest to participants that they bring a cup of tea, or another drink, along to the session to support a relaxed atmosphere.
- Finally, it is a great idea to ask for feedback from the participants after the book club through rolling out a short survey of questions. This can offer any ideas for improvement for your future sessions.
